

2. When you think of a "good" place to live, does the presence of public art make a difference to you?




3. When you visit other cities, do you notice the **presence** of public art?






4. When you visit other cities, do you notice the **absence** of public art?






5. Should a city's public art have a common theme? (Check all that apply)








7. Where would you like to see art displayed?





Frankly, I don't think much of what our community makes would be considered "large art"...enough to fill a void in a public park...so if you don't have that and the value of the art to the artist is substantial (in both the hours they've committed to the piece and the cost of supplies), then you're pretty much locked into doing it inside a public building. But maybe once every month...every three months...or every summer, you create a substantial event and you make it on the level of either a First Friday or (if it's once a year thing), the Chili Challenge. Go big or go home, right?

Small pieces inside, Larger pieces outside.

I like the wheat design on 87th from Quivira to Pflumm. It's subtle and it's incorporated into structures.

Like to see it. It's more difficult to see if indoors.
